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Promoting Palliative Care Education in Punjab...

The Institute of Palliative Medicine (IPM) has initiated a significant step towards advancing palliative care education through a strategic Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Sri Guru Ram Das University of Health Sciences (SGRDUHS) in Amritsar. This collaboration aims to equip healthcare professionals, including doctors and nurses, with the essential knowledge about palliative care and skills necessary to provide support during times of grief.

In the backdrop of this MoU, IPM and the University jointly organized a Bereavement Companionship workshop and a three-day foundation course in palliative care. This educational endeavour was conducted under the guidance of Dr. AP Singh, the Dean of SGRDUHS, with the able coordination of Dr. Harjot Singh and Dr. Paramjot Bindra.

This event marked the launch of the Bereavement Companionship Programme (BCP) in North India. BCP, a unique initiative developed by IPM WHO CC in collaboration with the Death Literacy Institute Australia, seeks to empower participants with an insightful understanding of grief and bereavement. It addresses the essential dos and don'ts when providing companionship to those in need.

Participants found the program to be an eye-opener, dispelling misconceptions surrounding bereavement. One participant shared, "This program has enabled me to unlearn myths about grief, and I now feel more confident in offering support to someone experiencing loss."


