MOU between IPM and Marie Curie Palliative Care Research Department (London)

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between IPM, the World Health Organization Collaborating Centre (WHOCC) for Country Capacity Building in Palliative Care and Long Term Care and Marie Curie PalliativeCare Research Department at University College London. This collaboration is for training and research in palliative care on a global scale. The term of the MOU is for a period 5 years and aims to share knowledge and expertise and improve the quality of life for patients and their families who are facing life-threatening illness.

Dr Suresh Kumar (Director WHOCC IPM) and Dr. Libby Sallnow, an Associate Professor and Head of Department of the Marie Curie Palliative Care Research Department formally signed this agreement at Vythiri Holiday Resorts in Wayanad on Wednesday, November 20th, 2024 during the Masterclass Conference.



Celebrating World Palliative Care Day



A day to celebrate and support palliative care around the world, this year the Theme was, ; Ten Years since the Resolution: How Are We Doing?' which asks the global community to explore some of reasons for failing to provide palliative care services to everyone.

Held at Calicut beach, nearly 60 student volunteers from 12 different colleges took part in celebrations that were aimed at creating awareness and raising funds for patients requiring palliative care. The students had organized cultural musical programs and fun games like treasure hunt and football shootout to attract and engage visitors.

More than 200 people took part in these celebrations! Placards and signboards conveying information about palliative care were made and volunteers distributed beautiful quotes about volunteering and giving back to the community. These inspiring messages have made the public more aware about palliative care and all of them were eager to learn more about IPM



FELLOWSHIP IN PALLIATIVE CARE – MASTERCLASS 2024



This Masterclass is an advanced international interactive learning program in palliative care and aims to address the global shortage of leadership in palliative care by providing high-quality, accessible and affordable training for participants mainly from low and middle income countries.

Held every 2 years for former participants of the Fellowship Program, this is a chance to evaluate their professional development and assess if they have created a positive change in their community. 48 candidates from 17 countries attended this program at Vythiri Holiday Resorts in Wayanad from November 18 th - 22 nd, 2024.

The Masterclass was a big success due to the 'dynamic, interactive format and the rich, cross-cultural exchange that took place among participants' said Mohammed Saif. It has also helped participants set clear, realistic and measurable goals which can help them perform better and accurately evaluate results. We hope that these classes will 'establish a worldwide platform for palliative care professionals to assist each other and improve patient care by

promoting the free flow of information across borders'.

homecare programs and covers all
aspects of nursing especially when
providing palliative care at home. Also
as this nursing manual has been
translated into Malayalam, it is better
suited for our nurses who are not
fluent in English.

Around 200 volunteers from over 20 colleges in and around Calicut took part in this new fundraising initiative by student volunteers. From procuring orders, to picking up inventory and ensuring that orders are properly prepared and delivered, every part of this campaign was undertaken entirely by student volunteers.

The campaign was a huge success and more than 1800 liters of payasam was sold, and all proceeds from the sale of payasam went towards the welfare of patients at IPM and the cost of services for patients requiring palliative care at home. National Fellowship in Palliative Medicine and Nursing

The new batch of 68 doctors and 12 nurses began classes for the National Fellowship in Palliative Medicine (NFPM) and National Fellowship in Palliative Nursing (NFPN), both one-year distance learning programs offered by IPM in collaboration with the Christian Medical Association of India.



Aim of the Program

The program aims to sensitize doctors and nurses by creating awareness about palliative care. It exposes them to the clinical and practical aspects of palliative care so that they are better equipped to deal with patients and this leads to an overall improvement in the patient's quality of life and well-being. Feedback for these training programs has been positive with participants saying that faculty was always accessible to the students providing them with strong mentoring and guidance. 'It was a great learning experience', said Satya Sita, one of the participants.

Team from Timor-Leste visits IPM



The World Health Organization (WHO) has initiated a project with IPM to deliver comprehensive training and establish patient-centered palliative care facilities at Timor-Leste by 2025. The project aims to build palliative care centers based on the community-led approach to palliative care that has been developed by IPM and is commonly referred to as the 'Kerala Model'.

A 4-member team came to IPM and spent time engaging and interacting with patients, caregivers, community volunteers, staff, health care professionals etc. They were given clinical training in pain and symptom management and shown how to develop managerial skills like setting up a new unit, building a team etc. They also accompanied the homecare team to see how care and comfort was provided to patients and their families in their own homes.

The team hopes to soon create a quality patient-centric Palliative Care Centre having inpatient, outpatient and homecare facilities for patients in Timor-Leste.

Rekha Vijayshankar who works in the UK came down to learn about the 'Kerala Model' of community-based palliative care. In a recent conversation over email, Rekha spoke with me about what brought her to Calicut, what she has learnt and would like to take back home and implement. These are excerpts of our conversation, which have been edited for length and clarity. Why the 'Kerala model' for delivery of palliative care?

My aim is to create a more 'equitable, culturally aligned and community-based palliative care access. 'I believe the Kerala model is aligned to this vision and hence my interest in this model of delivering palliative care'.

Can the Kerala model of palliative care be replicated to serve as a model for the rest of the world?

Countries around the world are spending less and less on healthcare and the Kerala model reverts the responsibilities of death and dying back with families and communities who work together and create a supportive community for the patient. This gives patients a sense of connection and belonging and that is why 'I think this is a very relevant and sustainable model'.
